### **Sun Protection for Our Eyes**

For those of us that wear glasses, we are familiar with the hassles of dealing with the sun! Do we go with contact lenses and regular sunglasses? Carry your glasses & Rx sunglasses wherever we go and switch as needed? Fit-overs that go over top of our regular glasses, clipons? Or transition lenses that go dark outside? No matter which option you prefer, sun protection for our eyes is a must!

We need to protect our eyes from harmful UV rays and help feel comfortable when it is too bright outside. This applies to any season or place where the sun and its reflective rays impact your eyes and vision. Ultraviolet (UV) rays damage the eye's surface tissues, cornea, conjunctiva, lens, as well as the retina. Over time, that damage can lead to pingecula, cataracts, and macular degeneration.

With sunglasses, we can often get away with buying an oversized frame, which provides better coverage! Wraparound style is another good option to limit UV rays from entering the sides of the glasses. Traditionally, tint options are grey or brown. But really any color tint is possible! A nice option is going with a gradient tint. This starts of darker near the top

of the lens and gradually gets lighter as it goes down the lens. Grey tends to feel darker, but advantages of brown colored lenses is that it can provide more contrast, and take the harshness of the bright sun away. I find on days when it isn't super sunny, but still bright outside, my brown lenses make my eyes feel more relaxed. Plus, I can run into the grocery store still wearing them, and not feel like it is too dark inside! Sometimes, the frame you are selecting dictates which lens color to go with.

Polarized sunglasses are a favourite among many. These lenses filter light by blocking some of the light from passing through the lens. Only light rays coming in vertically can pass through, while hori-

# Federal Budget: New Democrats use their power to deliver results

The recent federal budget offers more for Canadians because New Democrats in Parliament are using our twenty-five seats to get things done for people.

Most importantly, the budget includes funding to provide dental coverage to uninsured children, seniors and people living with disabilities with household incomes under

\$90,000. This significant expansion of public health insurance should be in place at the end of the year.

The uptake on an initial bridge benefit of \$1,300 per child under 12 was strong, with hundreds of thousands of children benefiting this year alone. The next expansion will apply to millions more.

Budget 2023, at the insistence of the NDP, also includes another doubling of the GST rebate. This measure helps almost 12 million Canadian households with the sharp increase in the cost of groceries without causing more inflation.

The federal government is finally making big investments in producing more low-emissions electricity and electrifying our industrial sector. For the first time ever, there are conditions on those federal investments. To get the benefit, companies will have to pay their workers according to the high standards for wages, benefits and pensions set by unionized workers. Measures like these are what it means to ensure that workers benefit directly from the creation of a low-carbon economy. New Democrats are leading the way to get workers a seat at the table.

The budget adds to the \$500 Canada Housing Benefit and other housing measures the NDP forced the government to adopt in the last budget cycle. The new measures include funding for Indigenous housing in urban, rural and northern communities. This will make a difference in many communities, especially in urban settings like Winnipeg, where





Indigenous people are dramatically over-represented among those experiencing homelessness.

These are all policy areas covered by the Confidence & Supply Agreement and the gains are a direct result of New Democrats choosing not to cause an election and instead make a positive difference in the lives of Canadians.

Of course, the agreement does not cover everything, only what could be agreed upon. There are many significant disagreements between New Democrats and Liberals about where the country is at, and even more so about where we should be heading.



#### Transcona Garden Club

May is what we have been awaiting, to see our gardens wake up after a long sleep. When the last bits of snow disappear, revealing the green shoots here and there, you can almost hear the big collective sigh from gardeners, "Ahhhh, at last!"! From the time the first Canada goose flew over the house on April 1st until today has seemed an eternity for me.

The urge to dive in and begin clearing away the leftover foliage in the beds may be strong but proceed with caution. Spring winds can be chilling for backs under skimpy jackets. Also, it is very easy to become overheated with exertion because

the overhead sunisstrong. Ourbodiesmaynotbeinprimeconditionforendlessbendingandlifting. We will get there in time but for now, we need to pace ourselves. The other problem is that there is still a possibility of heavy frost occasionally. Removing all the winter protection leaves new shoots vulnerable, especially for perennials pushing the hardiness zone. When all snow is gone, use whatever boughs remain from winter containers to provide protection if frost threatens. A late snowfall, however unwelcome, won't hurt.

What to do with all those 'pretties' that followed you home from your vis-

its to garden centers, big box stores and fellow gardeners who started too much of everything? One solution is to pot up your outdoor containers. You should have somewhere to pull them in for the night as tender annuals cannot take any frost. Coleus, begonias, sweet potato vines, impatiens and spiderworts are all susceptible to wind chill even if the thermometer says above 0 C. Others such as petunias, geraniums, pansies, snapdragons, etc., are tougher but also require hardening off gradually before being left to the elements.

The key to creating a beautiful landscape, on a large or small scale, is to choose the right plants for the right position. A north-facing home with a large overhang, will require some shade-loving plants for foundation plantings as they will be in shade most of the day. The sun-lovers can be positioned in the area that gets at least 6 hours of sun. Container plantings can provide an impressive impact by considering complimentary colours, shapes and textures for the Thriller, Filler and Spiller choices.

Something new in the Proven Winners collection is UPSIDE Key Lime Sweet Potato Vine. It can be grown on an obelisk alone or with spillers around the rim. Af these containers at the front of your home would give season-long colour.

# Busy spring at the Manitoba legislature

It's been a few months since I was appointed a Cabinet Minister in the Manitoba government. I am affectionally called the "Minister of the Alphabet" but my full title is "the Minister of Consumer Protection and Government Services, the minister responsible for the Manitoba Public Service, and the minister responsible for the Public Utilities Board".

Those months have sure been busy! Our government introduced a Budget with significant investments in schools, our health system, and public safety. It also includes a major increase to the Basic Personal Amount meaning that Manitobans' paycheques will increase starting in July as the amount of provincial income tax they pay goes down. The Liberals and NDP opposed these tax reductions. That's no surprise be-

cause at the same time, their federal cousins were busy increasing taxes on beer and wine while also jacking up the carbon tax. Higher taxation is the last thing we need. That will only further contribute to higher prices for groceries and gas.

This spring our government also announced significant investments in building new schools. Since 2019, projects to build 14 schools across Manitoba have been underway with new schools coming online every few months. That's in addition to the excellent renovations done at Bernie Wolfe School, the continued expansion of Ecole Regent Park, and the restoration of Westview School. This spring I had the privilege of announcing plans to build another NINE schools across Manitoba in a single bundle with the goal of opening



these schools by the 2027/28 school year. One of those schools is planned for the Devonshire/Peguis neighbourhood north of Costco.

The NDP, and specifically my neighbouring Transcona MLA Nello Altomare, have been pushing back against the plans to build these nine "P3" schools. A lot of misinformation has been spread so let me clear that up right now. The nine new schools will be much like the 14 schools already underway. They will be built to the same standards. They will be publicly owned. They will be operated by school divisions. Teachers will be able to do exactly the same things no matter if they are working in a P3 school or a traditional build. Anyone who tells you otherwise is just trying to spread fear instead of facts.

The difference with these nine new schools is that major maintenance like roof replacement, building envelope upgrades, and HVAC replacements for the first 30 years will be included in the initial contract. It's like buying a new vehicle with a



lengthy powertrain warranty. The hope is that this will encourage the builder to invest more up front in longer lasting designs and materials to reduce the long-term maintenance costs. Building the schools in a bundle will also get them done more quickly and at a lower cost. That's what students and families across our province want.

I think that's a common-sense approach. Care will need to be taken to ensure the contracts achieve these objectives, but that's always the case with any publicly tendered project. zontal light waves are blocked from passing through to your eyes. As a result, the image you see is a bit darker than usual, but objects look crisper and clearer. Polarized lenses, are particularly helpful for water and snow sports to really cut the glare reflecting off the water/snow. To learn about the pros and cons of polarized lenses, talk to your eye care provider.

Photochromic lenses have been around for decades. Transition lenses today, are available in a variety of

color options (grey, brown, amber, green, emerald, purple, blue). They change from clear lenses to dark lenses when exposed to UV light. They are convenient, and can save you money by only needing one pair of glasses. Although, technology has improved over the years, they can take longer to adjust in cold weather,

and they don't darken as well inside cars. The front windshield of the car blocks a lot of the UV so you are only getting UV exposure from the side windows.

There is no "best" option, it really is a personal choice which option appeals to you! Most important is to protect your eyes year-round! •


